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WHO IS JESUS – EXPLORING HIS STORIES LENT 2019

"With many such parables (stories) Jesus spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it." Mark 4:33-34

Following our Epiphany series, "Why Jesus?," we will spend Lent listening to, studying and praying about the meaning of some of Jesus' most popular parables. Many of these stories reveal the grace of God that includes in God's kingdom people we might rather see left behind.

Robert Capon, who wrote two books on these stories of Jesus, said:

"The Gospel of grace must not be turned into a bait-and-switch offer. It is not one of those airline supersavers in which you read of a \$59 fare to Orlando only to find, when you try to buy a ticket, that the six seats per flight at that price are all taken and that the trip will now cost you \$199.95. Jesus must not be read as having baited us with grace only to clobber us in the end with law. For as the death and resurrection of Jesus were accomplished once and for all, so the grace that reigns by those mysteries reigns eternally - even in the thick of judgment." — Robert Farrar Capon, Kingdom, Grace, Judgment: Paradox, Outrage, and Vindication in the Parables of Jesus

The Gospel—the Good News—of Jesus Christ is about drawing people in through love, even when that love is a mirror that reflects to us choices we make that harm ourselves and others.



The author of these words says they are among the hardest truths for humans to hear and claim. Other Christians put it this way: "Every time we draw a line between us and others, Jesus is always on the other side of the line."

Who's in and who is out can take up a lot of energy and worry. Some of us wonder if God could ever love us enough to accept us after how we've messed up our lives. Some too easily condemn others for real or perceived sins, hoping God won't allow them in to eternal life. Or we hold deep heartache for loved ones who stray from the way of Jesus. And others confine their lives to spaces where only "the good people" are present.

Where does your energy go on this issue?

This Lent, we will explore six short stories, or parables, of Jesus and see how Jesus used common images and people from his life in the Holy Land – and what it can mean for our lives today.

On Sundays, we will center our worship in reminding ourselves each week that we worship and follow our "Beautiful Savior." Wednesday evenings we will use the beloved Holden Evening Prayer of songs and words.

Join a weekly Bible study on Wednesdays at 1 PM with Pastor Bonnie to study these parables in small groups.





COMPLICATED GRIEF

(Mayoclinic.org & Frazerconsultants.com)

Losing a loved one is one of the most distressing and, unfortunately, common experiences people can face. Most people experiencing normal grief and bereavement have a period of sorrow, numbness, and even guilt and anger. Gradually these feelings ease, and it is possible to accept loss and move forward.

For some people, feelings of loss are debilitating and don't improve even after time passes. This is known as complicated grief, sometimes cause persistent complex bereavement disorder. In complicated grief, painful emotions are so long lasting and severe that you have trouble recovering from the loss and resuming your own life.

Grief is often only thought of as a mental experience, but there are also physical effects that come with it. Stress caused by grief has harmful physical effects on the body if it is prolonged. Although everyone grieves differently, most people experience some physical symptoms when grieving the loss of a loved one.

Physical Effects of Grief:

"Alarm Reaction" happens when the stress occurs. The brain produces a hormone called adrenocorticotrophic (ACTH)-prepares the body for battle. Then, the ACTH goes from the pituitary gland to the adrenal gland that causes a chemical reaction producing cortisol. Cortisol is known as the "stress hormone." Prolonged, high levels of this hormone have harmful and stressful effects on the body. So the longer the stress from grief continues, the more ACTH is produced, which means more stress hormones as well. Abnormally increased amounts of stress hormone can cause problems with the production of white blood cells, causing our bodies to not fight germs as well, increasing the likeliness of getting sick.

Complicated grief is like being in an ongoing heightened state of mourning that keeps you from healing.

Signs and symptoms of complicated grief may include:

- Intense sorrow, pain and rumination over the loss of your loved one
- ◆ Problems accepting the death, PTSD
- ◆ Numbness or detachment
- ◆ Feeling that life holds no meaning or purpose



Physical symptoms of Grief

- ◆ Aches and pains, chest pain
- ◆ Digestive problems
- ◆ Fatigue
- ♦ Headaches
- ♦ Insomnia
- ◆ Sore muscles and weakness

Contact your doctor or mental health professional if you have intense grief or problems functioning, find help with a grief support group.

GriefShare: Is a wonderful program that consists of people who understand how you feel and have a real concern for individuals experiencing the grief of loss. GriefShare leaders have experienced significant losses in their lives and are examples of healing and restoration that can occur as an outgrowth of deep grief.

Session are currently running at St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Columbia Heights on Thursdays from 12:30-2:30 PM. And at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Fridley on Thursdays from 9:30-11:30 AM.
