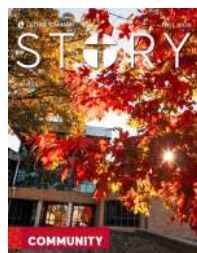

Report from Bishop Ann Svennungsen, Minneapolis Area Synod



God's grace, peace, and hope be with you through our Savior, Jesus Christ.

In a normal year, I would use this report to highlight the many ways the Synod partners with your congregation to bring good news to your communities. 2020 was hardly a normal year.

Like your congregation, the synod needed to adapt quickly due to the threat of COVID-19, to cancel some programs, introduce new events, and modify most everything else. I have been amazed by the innovation and hard work of congregational leaders. I want – and encourage you as well – to speak a word of deep thanks to leaders for all that has been asked of them to hold our communities together and foster their flourishing.

Shortly after lockdown restrictions began in March, synod leaders led training sessions on online worship and pastoral care, as well as conversations on the question of Holy Communion as part of distance worship. In April, our Synod Treasurer and Secretary led two sessions on applying for PPP loans. In May, we were privileged to host Dr. Michael Osterholm for a presentation which drew 400 pastors, bishops, and leaders; as well as 100,000 viewers afterwards. We gave over \$46,000 in Imagination Grants to 25 congregations to strengthen their online worship presence. This fall, we gathered leaders for a well-received conversation on creative ways to celebrate Christmas. The synod staff provided worship services in May, July, and December, giving congregational leaders a much-needed respite.

Yes, 2020 was hardly a normal year. On May 25, 2020, the killing of George Floyd lifted the veil once again on the pandemic of systemic racism that infects our world. Churches near the killing and the uprising turned on a dime to address the immediate needs, supported by partner congregations throughout the synod. Clergy marched in silence led by AME Presiding Elder Stacy Smith. The Minnesota Council of Churches – which includes all six ELCA synods – voted unanimously to support a multi-year process “Dismantling the Structures and Repairing the Damage of Racism in Minnesota.” The synod’s new racial justice web page (mpls-synod.org/

outreach/racial-justice) provides key information for congregations to deepen their work for justice, including the new Center for Leadership and Neighborhood Engagement, led by Rev. Kelly Chatman.

In addition to these efforts, we continue our essential and ongoing work of supporting leaders and fostering congregational vitality. We are blessed with over 700 rostered leaders, 325 serving in calls and 377 retired. We work hard so the church has the loving, faithful, and theologically well-formed ministers it needs. In 2020, we supported 67 persons preparing to become deacons or pastors.

In September, we were honored to receive a Lilly Grant that will support congregational cohorts committed to deepening their faith and neighboring practices. This month, we welcome Rev. Norma Malfatti as Director of Evangelical Mission who will promote our work in starting new congregations and accompanying our strategic ministries.

Our monthly conference meetings and other synod gatherings have revealed a real hunger among leaders to stay connected, learn from each other, and discern best practices for ministry in these times. We are honored and humbled by the calling to serve as convener of such holy conversations.

It is the generosity of congregations like yours that make the synod’s work possible. Thank you! We seek to be careful stewards of every gift. With the PPP loan, which we pray will be forgiven, we hope to end our FY2020 year budget without dipping deeply into reserves.

I conclude this annual report with a word of deep gratitude for the privilege of serving as your bishop. And, I look forward to January 2022, when we can once again worship and gather *in person* – with hugs and handshakes and singing.

Living Connected: To God and Each Other In the Time of Covid-19



Our lives were disrupted in ways we could not have imagined in March of 2020. At First Lutheran, we were in the midst of a new experiment, Wednesday Night Dinner Church, a way to connect relationally with others, to hear the Word of God, and to celebrate holy communion. We “redecorated” Martin Luther Hall, strung lights from the ceiling, and were overwhelmed when 60-80 people came each week!

And then it was over. The coronavirus, COVID-19, had been rumored to be spreading quickly around the world, and was now in the U.S. Dinner Church was over. Sunday Worship was over. All of our gatherings, with children, youth, adults, families, etc., were over.

It was the right thing to do, even if it was also an order from our governor.

But one thing was not over: The Sunday Community Meal.

As Council and Staff struggled with decisions about how to find a new way of being church, the Sunday Community Meal became an important consideration. This program of about four years had become an important way for friends and families to connect over a hot meal. It was open to the community, and we became familiar with those who came for just the meal. “We like that we can eat with all of you. We don’t feel like we’re on display,” one person told Jane Bugbee, our Community Faith Nurse.

The Community Meal is a great example of how we’ve remembered what’s important this year, and how we’ve re-imagined a ministry in the time of COVID-19. Jesus’ command to love one another was clear. But how do you serve a meal

without people sitting together inside? Drive-Thru Community Meal was born! The same great food by the same set of cooks, now packaged in to-go containers for people to pick up at church and enjoy at home.

The pastors and staff greeted people in line in the lot, listening to what was happening in people’s lives, and offering prayers and blessings. Those who helped to prepare and serve the meal found purpose in this work. In a time of isolation, they were caring for others.

For those who came through, it was a chance to check in, to be seen and heard, and to offer a blessing to the church, in addition to a hot meal. Or maybe they didn’t “need” the meal, but just wanted the opportunity to visit a bit from a safe distance with a mask on our faces.

Our food ministry serves the Sunday Community Meal, our After School kids and their families, our pre-COVID Gathering, and Lent soup suppers. That’s more than 10,000 meals served in 2020--during COVID!

This Annual Report is filled with stories like this. Thank you for taking the time to read it.

I am grateful for the work of so many to pray, discern, research and imagine new ways to be the hands and feet of Christ to others. To our Church Council, our Staff, and our Boards, I could not be more proud and honored. In some areas, we continue to look for opportunities. In others, we are already re-re-imagining what will happen next.

We have provided a weekly service available online. Even when the time comes for us to be able to worship together again in the building, we will continue to provide an online service

for those who appreciate it -- those confined at home, or those who spend time away for a season of the year, or just a weekend away.

Many of you have found ways to consider those who are most isolated from their loved ones because of COVID. Weekly mailings to homes who do not have internet access have been an important lifeline with ninety households. We send a worship service to use at home; a list of our weekly First Prayers; and updates about First Lutheran.

We must look forward and continue to work against racism and racial bias in our community, state and nation. The most important things we can do right now is listen to our neighbors who are people of color. A second step is to examine why we may be wary of conversation or interaction with people of color. And a third step

is to learn more about the advantages that are present for people who are white in our nation.

God has been faithful to us in spite of this unexpected time in our lives. God has been faithful through each one of you, and through me. Thank you for your generosity, understanding, patience, tolerance, and imagination!

In 2021, we continue the conversation that began in 2018 about our mission in this community. Here are some questions, based on the Bible, for our prayer and consideration and conversation and ACTION this year:

What does Love (God) require?
What kind of neighbor am I (are we)?

Pastor Report—Rev. Jill Bergman

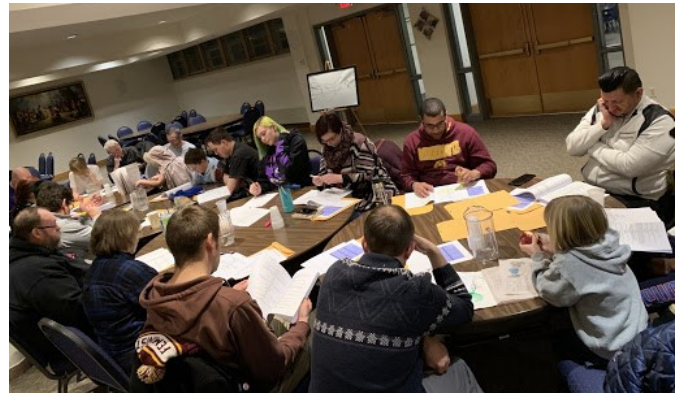

In this tumultuous year, I have witnessed true spiritual growth and renewal at First Lutheran Church. We were all shocked when we were suddenly told that we couldn't continue to function as normal. The ministry we engaged in was deep, nuanced by over 100 years of growing into our identity. Honestly, many of us had no idea there was any other way to serve our mission with Christ, or if there was, how we would go about it. Instead of giving up, however, we adapted. We insisted on continuing our ministry. We declared that no amount of evil and strife could overpower us.

Today I see that we grew more spiritually in 2020 than I have ever witnessed in any congregation in any single year. We testified by word and deed that Jesus is alive in our world. Jesus is alive in our congregation. Jesus is alive, and because of him, we live also.



I am proud of how we adapted to the challenges brought before us. We began the year strong. I was blessed to be able to go again to Mission Jamaica and to participate in building a house completely funded by FLC. We presented the homeowner with a quilt made by our Mission Workshop team.



We also began rehearsing for our annual Last Supper Drama. While we didn't get to perform it, we had many dedicated volunteers ready to give their time and creativity to the project.

Once Covid 19 took hold in our area, though, our time and creativity took on a whole new dimension. We learned how to bring Word and Sacrament outside of the Sanctuary, inviting people to meet Jesus in person through virtual ministry. We learned how to baptize believers into the Body of Christ and to welcome them from afar. We learned how to celebrate our graduating seniors from a safe distance. We learned how to serve our neighbors with food, prayer, and fellowship safely. We learned that Jesus Christ certainly is not limited by any illness. In fact, the Holy Spirit had already equipped us with everything we needed, before this pandemic struck, to effectively love God and neighbor.



In this year that has been challenging like no other, we have been richly blessed at First Lutheran Church to be reminded that we worship a God like no other. We discovered that the only limits to God's love were the limits we ourselves had placed upon it.

Encouraged by the spiritual growth we experienced in 2020, First Lutheran Church is continually adapting so we may continue to serve Jesus and this world that Jesus loves.

Children, Youth and Family Ministries Board Report—Rachel James



Thank you First Lutheran Church for all your support of children, youth and family ministries in our church and community this year! In this time of pandemic, we pivoted our ministries to connect online, outdoors, through the mail, and in prayer.

FAITH FORMATION

Confirmation this year has been online with CYF Intern Alexis Mattson as the primary teacher. There are 12 registered students. We have learned about New Testament stories and about the Creed. In addition to the online classes each Sunday, confirmation students have joined us for our monthly Family Fun Days in the church Courtyard.



We are very proud of our **2020 Confirmands**:

Emma Bendix, Hazel Bendix, Aria Bergman, Nora Pederson, Anna Presseller, Madison Ratliff, Roger Rogne and Caeden Shull. They each completed a project and pastor interview, along with three years of classes, service projects and events.

Sunday School has been an adventure as we move into online Sunday School! In the spring and throughout the summer, we did Storytime on FB Live each Sunday and mailed out packets to each Sunday School student each week. We ended the school year with the Blessing Bus where we visited the homes of each Sunday School and Confirmation student and handed out balloons and ice cream.

Twenty-five students registered for our Zoom Sunday School classes, with six amazing teachers. Thank you to John Miller, Franklin and Shirley Gummahdi, Janet Zarich, Christine Myhre and Kaylie Crotteau. We held a Thanksgiving Party on Zoom together and an online Sunday School Christmas program.

FLY Youth group has found new creative ways to stay connected! In the early part of 2020, we did a service project at SACA food shelf in partnership with St. Matthew's youth. We also had a fun night at Zero Gravity Trampoline Park and participated in Dinner Church.

Since the pandemic began we have done many Wednesday night Zoom youth groups online, playing games and studying the Bible together. We also have held 9 bonfire nights in the church Courtyard for in-person events with an average of 20 youth per event. It has been a powerful time to connect together. A big thanks to our TIM Team leader Ed O'Brien for doing high school leadership development once a month at youth group.

JUSTICE AND SERVICE

This year we focused on racial justice and learning as we responded to the death of George Floyd, the protests in Minneapolis and the much needed conversation about the effects of racism in our country. In partnership with Nathan Roberts, Director of Community Engagement and the rest of the staff team, we led several events.



- * **June:** Columbia Heights Town Hall on Race with many Black and People of Color neighbors sharing their experiences to about 100 community members
- * **July:** Visit to the George Floyd Memorial and art installation of people killed by police violence and service learning project to Christ Church International on Lake Street in South Minneapolis for 25 youth and parents
- * **July:** Zootopia Movie and Discussion Night for kids and families at the church courtyard for over 50 people, where we watched the movie and started discussion on racism and policing.
- * **November:** We hosted a community COVID-19 Vigil in Huset Park.

(Increased by 40 meals from in person meals on a Sunday)

This year was unlike any other and we had an amazing and committed team of H & O board members, volunteers, and staff who continued to be passionate and creative about life giving ministry in a pandemic. And speaking up and healing a city torn apart with grief, anger, racism, protests, and violence after the murder of George Floyd at the hands of a Minneapolis Police officer.

But each step of the way we put our heads and hearts into the work of meeting the physical, emotional, cultural, and spiritual needs of our community.

In March 2020, our first government lockdown was ordered. Our church went into action finding safe and creative ways to continue to serve Sunday Community Lunch in a drive through style. We did not skip a beat! Which is amazing and shows the commitment to our community. We had 125 people drive through the first Sunday with pastors outside to pray with those who drove through. Each week we see community members in need, some may be living in their cars and who appreciate a warm, healthy meal. We continually hear how grateful people are for this important ministry. The prayers from pastors and FLC members is appreciated by folks struggling with life during these challenging times.

We normally do not have community meals in

the summer but nothing is normal in 2020. So we continued with "Grill" style meals and had amazing grill masters step up to help us serve and maintain the relationships we created. People were clearly relying on this ministry as it was one of the few times we got to see people masked face to masked face. We had bakers drop off cookies to hand out as a special treat each week.

In the fall we really began to see a growing need. We were serving around 150 each week. We did have a COVID exposure on Nov. 8th and had a paired down box lunch meal served the following Sunday. We had our first drive through Pancake Breakfast and raised \$1,500 for SACA Food Shelf in Columbia Heights. We asked the community to match this gift and we were inspired by the amazing donations that came in from the wider community!

We are eager to continue to serve our community and adapt to whatever comes next.

Our After School Program continued to serve healthy meals and mentorship to 20-30 kids on Tuesday and Thursdays each week. This year that meant working with a team of volunteers to cook,

bag, load the bus, and deliver meals to homes of families in our neighborhood. This meal delivery allowed us to continue to support our families in need. It also gave us a chance to connect with the students on their school, mental health, and

physical health. Many of our stops turned into discussions about how we could pray for families and help meet immediate needs. Like how to get students art supplies, or to listen to a mom worried about a relative with COVID.

We were blessed to have three amazing Northwestern University education students as Interns this fall. This was a brief and fun chance to connect in person with masks. However, as COVID numbers rose we returned to delivery in November. We plan to continue to deliver meals through the winter.

Discussion Groups about Race and Racism
Participants in 4-week Discussion Groups: 115
Volunteers: 5 per week

On May 25 George Floyd was murdered by a Minneapolis Police officer. This event shook Minneapolis and the rest of the world. Protests and riots were spreading across Minneapolis and St. Paul. First Lutheran was looking for a way to respond to the grief, anger, and call to stand with our brothers and sisters of Color against racism in our community.

We were approached by community leaders of color to co-host a community town hall at Huset Park. We provided the sound system and social media marketing for the event. Rachel James and



Nathan Roberts spoke alongside a dozen speakers of color. It was pouring rain and yet people stayed and listened (even when our sound system shorted out twice!) We heard powerful stories encouraging Columbia Heights residents to do more to welcome their neighbors of color into our community.

Afterwards three next step options were provided for those who attended. The people of color gathered to speak about next steps. Rachel James helped white parents talk to their children about race and racism.

The H & O board, Nathan Roberts, and Pastor Bonnie had participated in a Race and Racism discussion group class in 2019. Because of this preparation work we were able to offer a class on how white people can have better discussions about race and racism. We had 115 people sign up for the 4-week discussion groups. It was powerful and healing for the people who participated.



To broaden the discussion, we hosted an all-ages outdoor movie night to talk about the themes of prejudice, racism, and systemic racism in the movie Zootopia. In September, we hosted a storytelling night for community members of color to talk about what they had experienced and learned over the summer.

We remain committed to continue the discussions and address racism in Columbia Heights going forward.

SOME HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2020:

They complement our remarkable staff and help us to not only be good stewards but build relationships with one another – the volunteers bring expertise in the various areas required to manage a building like this but also a spirit of benevolence and investment in the mission that happens out of this building, even during a pandemic! The kitchen stayed busy during this unprecedented year, with community meals, meals for After School kids, TESFA school children, preparing cookies and baskets for many. Outdoor propane heaters were purchased to continue outdoor ministries as the weather got colder! Adapt. Adapt. Adapt.

We continue to have a strong partnership with TESFA. Although, with all schools, Tesfa has had seasons of the school year that have been distance learning – we are all anxious to have the kiddos back in the building the end of January!

Additionally, FLCCH was working with two new grant funded projects this year.

Faith Community Nurse Report—Jane Bugbee

Flexibility is my word for 2020 as your Faith Community Nurse (FCN)! With shut-downs and restrictions of our usual work, flexibility has kept me going this past year. Flexibility is used often on our Mission Jamaica Mission trips which we were able to go in 2020, but sadly, not for 2021.

I began as your FCN in November of 2010, just as our dear member, Adelyn Rime's kidneys started to fail. Adelyn was my first parish nurse visit at Methodist Hospital. Back then, I provided nursing education about her dialysis future. I continued on with her dialysis journey over the years, and then supported her decision to end dialysis a few months ago. I was honored to say goodbye and give her communion one last time at Ark on the River Hospice, and then speak at her funeral. Wow!

Despite not being able to visit physically with our members at hospitals, assisted living facilities, or in their homes, I feel closer to our members than ever thanks to making hundreds of phone calls. I have helped our FLC members reach out to members via Community Connection Groups and Christmas Groups.

A joy for me was All-Saints Day. Who knew a small brass bell could bring such joy and tears! This year, I delivered a little brass bell, along with condolences and instructions for families that had lost a FLC loved one for our All-Saints Day on-line service. Families were able to ring their bells when their family member's name was spoken during our on-line service. Delivering the bells brought me much joy and immense tears of joy to the recipients!

I was honored to speak at the Prayer Vigil on Nov. 1, communicating about how the pandemic has affected our FLC seniors who have been isolated from family and friends. Pastor Bonnie allowed everyone to "scream!" out loud for them!

Grant writing despite the pandemic has continued to be a joy! This year we received a grant for a new AED thru Allina Heart Safe program, along with a rebate for our ten-year-old AED we returned to the manufacturer.

Another grant from Anoka County for the Gathering program held at FLC brought us \$10,000 for room improvements for our elderly dementia clients. We are still getting improvements purchased, but soon we will have new cabinets, a smart TV, microphones, and other items to make the Gathering technologically better for our seniors, along with sharing with the youth who use this room. Unfortunately, a sink that would have been nice, just is not to be in the 1922 part of our building!

M Health Fairview will be sending the After-School Program \$500 before the end of the year to support our kids with food and a hand sanitizer station.

Cooking for the After-School home delivery program all summer, and continuing into this fall and winter twice a week has given me joy. Despite the kids being stuck at home learning, not being able to come to FLC, we are able to check in with these at-risk kids and provide a hot meal twice a week.

Hopefully 2021 will bring renewal and healing from the pandemic, just as the vaccines are being shipped to Minnesota and inoculations begin today!

Community Garden Report—Dan Fishbeck

In its seventh year, 2020 brought unique challenges for the FLC Community Garden stemming from the Covid-19 pandemic. During this year of uncertainty, widespread food insecurity and social distancing, the garden team modified several processes to ensure everyone would remain safe and healthy. Social distancing is easily accomplished in a garden of this size!



With good weather, water, and soil, the garden again produced well over 2000 pounds of fresh and healthy vegetables. Produce was distributed at the Sunday Farmer's Market at FLC and the after-school program (both drive-up). The pandemic also had negative impacts for SACA. The FLC garden provided hundreds of pounds of fresh produce to SACA (delivered by Linda Pettigrew) to help bridge the gaps in the food chain within our community. The curbside Sunday meals at FLC also utilized the bounty from the bumper crop we were blessed with this year.

In 2019, three flowering crab trees were planted on the north side of the garden. The trees are doing very well and produced beautiful flowers to welcome spring and now have fruit that will remain on the trees until spring which will help feed migrating birds. A fourth flowering crab was planted this year to complete the grouping. Spring bulbs planted in the fall of 2019 brought a burst of color as they popped up even while there was still snow on the ground.

The garden and its surrounding flowing plants have been installed to help the pollinators in our midst that

are so important to a balanced ecosystem.

2021 will be the eighth year of the FLC garden. It has grown and seen many improvements over these years. This coming season will be a year to rebuild several vegetable bed frames that are disintegrating. Maintenance and rebuilding work will reduce the total number of beds planted in 2021. This is necessary in order to keep the health and wellbeing of the garden space in proper condition. Planning over the winter will determine which beds need repair as well as other much needed maintenance items. Crop selection for next year will be carefully considered to ensure the "favorites" with high demand are prioritized for spring planting.



Thanks to the many volunteers who have assisted in the garden in so many ways! Additional garden volunteers are always welcomed and appreciated, contact Dan if you're interested, no experience required! As we head into another winter, visions for next year begin to sprout anew!

Report of the Board of Finance—Chad Habeck

Dear First Lutheran Family,

The year 2020 will certainly go down as one for the books. We started the year out like normal, and then mid-March, boom! A global pandemic hits like a ton of bricks and turns everyone and everything on its head.

From a finance perspective, we went into the year with a budget projecting a loss of about \$47,000 and the plan was to use funds from our special projects undesignated gifts bucket to cover this shortfall. We also had a goal of a 5% increase in overall giving to try and offset this shortfall. We also had a budget in total offerings at about \$390,000 and special gifts at \$70,000.

Then in March, with COVID - 19 spreading, gatherings and in person worship were put on hold. So, all of a sudden, we couldn't worship in person. And as a result, we start having budget discussions to figure out a plan for how to navigate these uncharted waters. We of course, had lots of questions. How are our members that give their gifts using envelopes or cash in person going to continue to support FLC? How do we make sure we still are able to pay our normal bills? What do we do about staffing if we are not meeting at church? Do we continue to pay them their normal salary? Do we have to think about furlough? What about income from Tesfa, the charter school that we share space with. How are they and our monthly rent from them impacted?

All of these questions with the virus situation and rules and advice constantly changing, made for an interesting year to say the least.

So, nine months later, how are we doing? How did we do?

First of all, we continued to

keep all full-time staff at full time. Unfortunately, we had to decrease hours for a few part-time folks, but this was due to the fact that with no in-person gathering, there wasn't the need.

We applied for and received a loan from the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) as part of the federal government Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) act. This program provides small businesses with funds to pay up to 8 weeks of payroll costs including benefits. Funds are provided in the form of loans that will be fully forgiven when used for payroll costs, interest on mortgages, rent, and utilities. Thanks to the work of our business administrator, we applied immediately for this loan, and in mid-April, we received \$103,000. In the months that followed, we followed the guidelines and terms of the loan and thankfully received confirmation that our loan had been forgiven. That's right, it became a grant and does not need to be repaid.

Our church set up online worship and also decided to provide meals every Sunday via drive up. What a HUGE success both of these have been. This gave us all a chance to worship together, albeit virtually, and gave folks a chance to come to church to get a meal. And lots of you came to not only get meals, but to drop off your giving envelopes or to pray with a pastor or just to say hello as you drove though.

Our estimated envelope giving is down about \$30,000 from budget, but considering how hard this virus has been on our economy, we are very pleased and grateful to our congregation for their continued support. God bless you all!



However, our special gifts for the year is trending to be up by \$30,000, so that means from an income standpoint, we are on budget in a year with a global pandemic. Absolutely amazing. God is good and so are our members.

And thankfully Tesfa was still able to maintain their financial commitments for the year, even though they had a smaller number of students.

Add it all up, and we on the finance board can honestly say that we are very pleased and blessed and thankful to all of our members and community for their amazing support.

One other item of note. Our business administrator for the last three years, Dave Reilly, ended up leaving us late in the year and thankfully our own Julie Wilson stepped in to help and is now on staff learning the ropes and doing a great job for us in this position. Thank you Dave for your time with us and welcome Julie!

Lastly, I'd like to thank the other members of this board for helping me navigate this strange and challenging year, I couldn't do it without you: Rock Hauser, Chris Larson, Rebecca Dodson, Wendy Watson, Blaine Barnhart and David Hagen.

Description of Funds

The Memorial Fund consists of gifts received from congregation members and friends in memory of loved ones. These gifts are often designated for a program or activity that was near and dear to the individual being memorialized. The Endowment Fund consists of gifts given for the long-term, future benefit of the congregation, as well as the earnings generated by those gifts. The Endowment Fund is a "permanent" fund in that the gifts received - or principal - are held in perpetuity ("Dollars Forever"). Only the earnings generated by investing these gifts are spent.

Summary of 2020 Activities

THE GOAL FOR THE ENDOWMENT FUND IN 2020 WAS TO INCREASE ITS UNDESIGNATED BASE BY 3%, WHICH IS \$30,400.00. Attained.
