Doing Hard Things...

"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Philippians 4:13

"I see your fear, and it's big. I also see your courage, and it's bigger. We can do hard things." Author Glennon Doyle in her book, Untamed

had every type of German Lutheran immigrant Reconstruction. Black Americans moved you could imagine. Some loved sauerkraut, others hated it. Less than eight hundred people and to distance themselves from the racism lived in my hometown and we had four churches--all Lutheran, and all begun by German immigrants to northeast Iowa.

There were a few non-German Americans around, but I didn't know any of the farmers of Irish descent. And I only knew one Swedish-American farmer, and he was an old Army friend of my dad's living up in Minnesota.

Like many rural kids, I grew up without any racial diversity in my community. I never had a Black friend or a Latino classmate. I never saw anyone in a hijab or who spoke Arabic.

Then in 1990, in my early 30s, I helped to lead a mission trip to Milwaukee to help build and refurbish homes through Habitat for Humanity in one neighborhood: north Milwaukee. This community was similar to my hometown, except for one thing: race. Nearly 100% of north Milwaukee was Black.

My hometown in rural Iowa had been settled by people who knew each other in eastern Germany. Immigrants who packed the belongings they could carry and intentionally chose to come to Iowa to be neighbors with their old friends.

I quickly learned Black families had a very different story of how they come to north Milwaukee. These Black families had packed their few belongings and came to Milwaukee

I grew up on a farm in a small community that from the South after the Civil War and after north for the promise of better-paying jobs and discrimination in the South. They also wanted a better education for their children.

> How they ended up in one neighborhood in Milwaukee was not their choice. They left the segregation of the South, only to find a new segregation in the North. These Black families were told by bankers and city planners that they could ONLY move to this neighborhood. And inside north Milwaukee, banks conspired to keep Blacks as renters, and not as homeowners. Home ownership, you see, accumulates wealth. Renting does not. This scenario of redlining happened all across the U.S.

> At the time I was struggling to understand how so much hatred and racism could exist in God's world, and even within God's Church! I began reading the German Lutheran pastor and Nazi resister, Dietrich Bonhoeffer that summer. Some of you may remember his story from the Fall Drama in 2019. Bonhoeffer was living in Germany where Jews were being put in segregated neighborhoods. His book, The Cost of Discipleship, challenged me to do hard things, especially these words:

"Grace is costly because it calls us to follow, and it is grace because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ. It is costly because it costs a man his life, and it is grace because it gives a man (or woman) the only true life."

Senior Pastor's column continues

I didn't know the whole history of north Milwaukee until I had spent a couple of summers there, trying to understand why home ownership was so difficult in the Black community. It was hard and painful work to learn the difficult history of this city. And the more I learned the more I realized that this was happening all over the country. You can watch the PBS documentary, "Jim Crow of the North," if you want to learn more about this history in Minnesota.

<u>Reading Pastor Bonhoeffer, and the Bible's</u> <u>clear embrace of diversity reminds me that</u> <u>this is faith work</u>. Understanding each other as children of the same God is faith work. And it has always been a hard thing to do. Otherwise, St. Paul wouldn't have needed to write:

"There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." Galatians 3:28

In the year since the murder of George Floyd, what is a hard thing you have learned to understand or live out in your life about racism? It has certainly challenged me, and I continue to become painfully aware of my privilege and of the injustice experienced by our Black neighbors.

 \rightarrow What is the hard thing you want to understand in yourself in relation to racism and poverty in the Twin Cities and Minnesota? What are you willing to invest to learn more?

'White privilege doesn't mean your life hasn't been hard. It just means the color of your skin isn't one of the things that makes it harder.' Wherever you stand, I don't see how you can argue with that." Jimmy Kimmel, late night talk show host.

On another page in this issue of The Caller, I've shared some statements that explain white privilege in daily life. I hope you will find them helpful. As you know, my daughter is not white and she understood these "rules" long before I realized them. My faith work continues, as does yours.

As our neighborhood and world changes, we commit to adjust as well, making space for growth, healing, generosity and community-building. We will honor each other's diverse stories and continue living connected to God and to each other. We rely on God's Spirit to guide us.

UNDERSTANDING WHITE PRIVILEGE

This is a companion piece to Pastor Bonnie's column on page 1.

Journalist Ella Alexander wrote this article, "Understanding White Privilege: 20 Everyday Examples," in January 2021. I share seven of the points she made here to help understand privilege we may not be aware of in our daily lives:

- 1. I can, if I wish, arrange to be in the company of people of my race most of the time.
- 2. If I should need to move, I can be pretty sure of renting or purchasing housing in an area which I can afford and in which I would want to live.
- 3. When I am told about our national heritage or about "civilization," I am shown that people of *mv* color made it what it is.
- 4. Whether I use checks, credit cards or cash, I can count on my skin color not to work against the appearance of financial reliability.
- 5. I can swear, or dress in second-hand clothes, or not answer letters, without having people attribute these choices to the bad morals, the poverty, or the illiteracy of my race.
- 6. I am never asked to speak for all the people of my racial group.
- 7. I can easily buy posters, postcards, picture books, greeting cards, dolls, toys, and children's magazines featuring people of my race.

"LIVING CONNECTED" IN THE COMMUNITY:

A. Support for Zion Baptist Church, north Minneapolis

The Memorial & Endowment Committee, Finance Board and Church Council approved a \$5,000 grant to Zion Baptist Church, whose boiler has been condemned. Along with several other Lutheran congregations, and sizable financing from the City of Minneapolis, we are helping to stabilize an important community of faith in north Minneapolis.

B. Bus Loan to Bilingual Learning Center (BLC), Mpls

When the Minneapolis Public Schools were not able to provide after-school services to take children to after-school programs for tutoring, we offered our older bus to help transport 30 children from school to Lake Nokomis Lutheran Church where BLC meets. We'll do this until the school district provides bus transportation again.

C. Rapid Response Team for **Columbia Heights**

Nathan Roberts, Rachel James and Pastor Bonnie Wilcox are part of a task group in Columbia Heights put together by the mayor to talk about how the community can respond to a catastrophic event, whether an officer-involved shooting, a structural collapse, tornado, or other type of disaster that affects many people. The group is working in partnership with the Chief of Police and other community leaders to offer support Simula & Mayor Mike Elliott in the form of community gathering

spaces, pastoral care and emergency aid, etc.
