Report from Bishop Jen Nagel, Minneapolis Area Synod

On the evening of Jesus' resurrection, as two of his followers were walking along the road that leads from the city of Jerusalem to the village of Emmaus "talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them." - Luke 24

Grace and peace to you, beloved of Christ Jesus.

This resurrection story is a favorite. We walk together as church, and Jesus draws near and walks with us. The labors of the day, the content of our discussions, the swirl of society and politics, the hopes and fears, these things shift, and yet, Jesus walks with us and is known once again as we gather together around the table.

What a year this has been. This report to the worshipping communities of the Minneapolis Area Synod is an opportunity to look back on 2024, and to look ahead at the year to come. Most of all, it is an opportunity to name and celebrate some of the ways the Holy Spirit continues to enliven God's church. We give thanks to you and your congregation for your partnership in this ministry we share.

On May 4, 2024, you elected me to serve as your Bishop. On August 1, 2024, I took office, and on September 21, 2024, I was installed during a festive and moving worship service at Central Lutheran Church. This election • 52 pastors and deacons serving in represents a significant threshold in our synod's life as we continue by the Spirit's leading along paths yet unknown. Thank you for your trust and your continued prayers. We are particularly grateful for the intentional work of the Bishop's Election Committee. My deep thanks to Bishop Ann Svennungsen for her 12 years of faithful leadership, and for her generosity of wisdom and spirit as I learn the ropes. As I have restructured parts of our synod's ministry team, we have had several staff transitions. Some have completed their service,

over the summer and fall we welcomed a few new staff, and in 2025 we will welcome more. Thank you to our staff for their patience, perseverance, faithful ministry, and good courage during a long transition.

Stepping into this role, I am more mindful than ever that we are Church Together: Learning Together, **Listening Together, Serving Together, Worshipping Together**

A few highlights from 2024:

- 137 worshipping communities, including
 - * 3 new starts congregational
 - * 8 strategic ministries
- 3 congregations marked Holy Closures this year, honoring their years and ministry, and in closing, stewarded their assets by contributing to Resurrection Fund.
- 11 languages spoken in worship
- 62 call processes in 55 congregations
- 8 ordinations of new pastors and deacons and
- 24 rostered ministers installed into new positions
- 34 people discerning a call to ministry and active in our candidacy process
- 305 pastors and deacons currently serving in our synod, and around 370 retired ministers
- specialized ministries, including chaplains, educators, social ministry leaders, and missionaries
- 5 years of Faith Practices and Neighboring Practices cohorts supported by a grant from the Lilly Endowment's Thriving Congregations Initiative, with plans to apply for a scaling grant in 2025
- 17 congregations in the current cohort of Faith Practices and Neighboring Practices, and
- 13 in the first cohort (that's nearly 1/4 of our synod's congregations!)

• \$1.25 million grant received from the Lilly



- 800 people attended the Bishop Installation in person, including 220
- \$2,681,409 pledged in Mission Support, with 50% supporting MAS ministry and 50% for ELCA ministry
- 2 companion synod partnerships: Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria (LCCN) and the Leipzig District-Evangelical Lutheran Church in Saxony, Germany, including visits from Archbishop Musa Filibus (LCCN), Superintendent Sebastian Feydt and Pastor Cristoph Reichl (Leipzig)
- Synod staff supported leaders and congregations, convening, communicating, collaborating, and navigating conflicts
- Hosted many special events such as an Eco Faith Summit, Boundaries Workshop, Bishop's Theological Conference, Ministeriums, and Communicators Gatherings

What a gift to reflect on the amazing ways we were Church Together in 2024! We look forward to 2025 with the Conference Assemblies in February, Synod Assembly (May 2 -3), and the ELCA Churchwide Assembly (July 28 - August 2). We walk together as church, trusting that Jesus continues to come near and walk with us. We are Church Together.

Why do the staff do their jobs so well? Just for a salary? Why do we as a congregation keep coming here every Sunday? Because we like to visit with each other? No, it is much greater than that.

FAMILY Report—Warren Watson

he FAMILY ("Facility And Mission In our Latter Years") Committee was chartered by the Church Council in 2023. The purpose of our committee is to explore our congregational relationship with our Church building. This is important because while we have a strong rental relationship with Bultum Academy today, there is always the possibility that Bultum might move to another location, leaving us unable to afford our building without new renters. Rather than address these challenges when we are in search of a new renter, our committee was chartered to evaluate all options while we have a great renter relationship in place.

The Committee engaged Pastor Jeff Kjellberg (Kairos Group) to support this Committee.

In 2023 we implemented the "Missional Assessment Profile" ("MAP") study to assess our congregational impact, effectiveness, and potential. Our committee was pleased to have 123 members of our congregation participate in this assessment...THANKS to each of you for helping us! The results of this MAP include a wide variety of responses too many to capture in this summary. That said, I'd like to mention two specific indicators from the survey: 1) our congregational respondents feel a strong connection with our Mission and 2) we are ready to make some bold decisions and advance this Mission in new and renewed ways! This is great news!

We also met with several local civic leaders, property managers, business leaders and community leaders. These small group sessions were intended to brainstorm ways in which our property can be of greatest good in the community of Columbia Heights and the surrounding area. In summary it is fair to say that these participants appreciate how our property is currently being of service to our community. They also see many ways we might use our property to expand our impact on our community in the future!

In early 2024 we entered a pause in our activity due to Pastor Bonnie's medical leave. The nature of our work as the FAMILY Committee is largely driven by the Sr. Pastor and their long-term vision for First Lutheran Church. The committee will remain on pause pending the arrival of our next Sr. Pastor. In the meanwhile, if you have any questions, concerns and recommendations please reach out to any one of the Committee members. Thanks for your support!

Associate Pastor Report—Rev. Jill Bergman

his year revealed a focus for ministry that looked beyond what was easily accessible. I felt deeply moved to seek Jesus both within our congregation as well as beyond what was familiar. Paul wrote to the Galatians, "Understand, then, that those who have faith are children of Abraham. Scripture foresaw that God would justify the Gentiles by faith and announced the gospel in advance to Abraham: 'All nations will be blessed through you.' So those who rely on faith are blessed along with Abraham, the man of faith." (Galatians 3:7-9).

2024 began with an opportunity I had never dreamed would present itself to me. I was blessed to be able to travel to Greece with a group of other clergy and their spouses to learn about Paul and his missionary journeys. This was provided to me through my generous continuing education budget at First Lutheran and also at a generously reduced cost from Good Shepherd Travel.

My spiritual growth during this experience was surprising even to me. I left Greece longing to discover more about the spread of the Gospel at its beginning, how it continues to spread today, and my role in that evangelistic process. Outgrowths of this experience included working with members of First Lutheran to create a Travel Ministries podcast series where we shared stories about how we met Jesus away from home; a commitment to bring others to Greece to give them the opportunity to expand their faith and understanding of the Gospel; and a strong desire to open First Lutheran's hospitality on a deeper level to the faithful who have walked a different path from ours.

Working with the Board of Spiritual Growth, we developed an emphasis on showing hospitality specifically to those whose first language is Spanish. We have been welcoming native Spanish speakers at a greater rate to a variety of ministries at First Lutheran, so our board decided to lean into supporting them as much as possible. To that end, we hosted a Spanish/English Conversation Circle each Sunday in July, we worked with Angela Gallo to provide for her to translate our weekly bulletins into Spanish, and we have placed a greater emphasis on including Spanish in our worship services. Our biggest learning opportunity came when our board was able to attend the Latine Ministry Workshop presented by Wartburg Seminary and offered virtually in December. We feel challenged and called to push ourselves to share the Good News beyond what is familiar to us.

Together with First Lutheran, we strive to creatively present the message of Jesus in ways new people will understand and the longtime faithful will find inspiring. I love the podcast format for offering our witness both to our congregation and also to people we may never meet. Besides the Travel Ministries series, we also created a Lenten podcast series which explored the Gospel of Mark, a Financial Stewardship series which asked how God intersects with our money, and an Advent series exploring Messianic prophecies. We also presented our annual Last Supper drama which is like a live action worship/drama experience.

One unique opportunity for me was the invitation to partner with the City of Columbia Heights as they



designed a plan for energy usage in their community. I'm in a group called "Partners in Energy" which, over 6 monthly sessions, is investigating the energy needs of all Columbia Heights residents and businesses, as well as discerning how to equitably, conscientiously, and economically distribute or create the energy needed. As the sole clergy member in the group, I feel honored to be able to provide a faithful lens with which we can view the people and land that make up Columbia Heights and provide for their needs.

The biggest blessing of this year has been growing in faith with the people of First Lutheran Church. Each of us has faced challenges but we have continually supported one another and learned more about the community of our Triune God in the process. May First Lutheran be an integral part of God blessing all the nations!

has been a busy and challenging year at First Lutheran Church with staff changes, a transition in leadership, some unexpected maintenance projects and maintaining a busy building that has seen a large number of events in 2024 (this provides additional income for FLCCH). I am extremely proud of the FLCCH staff that kept all financial and operational activities as smooth as possible, the Finance Committee who worked hard to keep FLCCH financially healthy and the maintenance committee (Jody Chandler, Larry Bugbee, Bruce Shellito, Roger Johnson and Nathan Roberts) who met monthly to review all current and future projects. Also, a big thank you to my faithful volunteers: Marilyn Lueth who enters donations into our database, and those who help count weekly offerings, Jan McFall, Cheryl Blinkman, Bobbie Sauer, Kathy Ballard and Joyce Beeksma.

Besides managing the financials including the close monitoring of the cash flow to be able to cover all fixed and unexpected expenses:

- we negotiated a new addendum to our lease with Bultum Academy.

- worked with the Personal Committee on staff changes and new federal payroll laws.
- were guided by Joyce Weaver in a project to upgrade and move to high speed Business Internet to better accommodate Live Streaming, Podcasting, Wi-Fi and overall work performance.

Besides the projects mentioned in the Finance Committee report we also finished the following repairs in 2024:

- Katie Luther room was reorganized and additional storage was added.
- The playground received a new fence as well as improved lighting.

- Three of our a/c units took on major repairs.
- Our fire alarm panel was replaced after a surprise failure.
- The "mud room" storage room was cleaned and completely reorganized giving more storage and meeting options



As you read this report, consider which topics deal with spiritual diet and which are spiritual exercise, and which are both. Our goals for 2024 were:

- ⇒ Make the Bible more accessible
- ⇒ Promote care of the earth
- ⇒ Create a Spanish language bulletin
- ⇒ Offer a cooperative Spanish language learning event

On Pentecost Sunday, Bob Nelson and Mel Robinson passed out free Bibles, as well as many (50-75) QR code cards for a Gideon Bible app, which gives access to the Bible in many languages. The Gideons have also provided New Testaments in English and Spanish for After School Kids. On May 5, we hosted a compost distribution event. Along with help from our youth, we distributed 4 cubic yards of compost! The leftovers found a home in our church garden. Look for this event again next spring, probably closer to 40th Ave.

A topic that received a lot of attention this year was how we can best meet the needs of our neighbors who primarily speak Spanish. In the latter part of the year, we sponsored Angela Gallo to generate Spanish translations of the bulletin and announcements each Sunday. During July, we had sessions in



the commons after worship to learn some Spanish vocabulary; attendance was very good. (And some of us continued the process online at home with DuoLingo or other free programs). In November, Angela constructed a beautiful Ofrenda in our commons, during a Mexican tradition called Dia de

Los Muertos recognizing those who have passed away. Several FLC members were touched and added pictures or other remembrances of their loved ones. In December,

Memorial and Endowment sponsored the attendance of four of us at an online workshop sponsored by Wartburg Seminary (three sessions) on developing Latine Ministry Competencies. We hope to develop this topic further in 2025.

Randy Bergman has worked with us to schedule Adult Forum sessions on the first Sunday of each month during the school year. In October, Mark Bornhoft presented a discussion based on his book, "Our Cultural Journeys in the Digital Age: From Where do we Get our Guidance?", in which he describes the faith journeys of Christians from different parts of the globe. In December, Pastor Scott led a discussion of "Holiday Traditions".

Pastor Jill coordinated three podcast series during the year. First was a daily podcast series by FLC members and staff during Lent, focusing on Mark. Second was a series of three podcasts by members in an interview format regarding stewardship of our finances. And third was a daily podcast series during Advent connecting Old Testament prophecies with New Testament fulfillments.

We support two weekly Bible Studies, one before and after worship services led by Michelle Edwards, and one at 6pm on Wednesday's. All are welcome to participate as their circumstances permit. In addition, all are invited to participate in two monthly prayer sessions. The first is Healing Prayers, led by one of our pastors in the front of the sanctuary at about 11:15 after worship. Watch your bulletin for dates of Healing Prayers. The second is prayers for all concerns, but especially for the church council and our Call Committee. That meeting is on Tuesdays from 5:30 to 6:30pm, just prior to the monthly council meeting.

Call Committee Report—By Pastor Scott Jakel

n Sunday, Nov. 10, 2024, we held a special congregational meeting and elected the following six members of FLC to be the Call Committee: *Drew Stolba, Meagan Ferrise, Jan McFall, Ruth Dodson, Bob Nelson, and Larry Bugbee.*

They have been quite active in their work in 2024 and in the early days of 2025 to prepare for and help secure the person who will be our next senior pastor. They will be interviewing pastoral candidates and recommending one for the senior pastor position.

As part of that preparation process, they're facilitating various avenues to hear from the congregation's members, staff, and community to be able to review, assess, and claim the priorities, strengths and growth areas of the congregation. While they are doing this work, the church council and other members of the church are working with the staff and other leaders on initiatives that need to be addressed along the way - in advance of calling this pastor. This will involve them getting feedback and focusing on our

community challenges as well as opportunities the congregation will face in the next 5-10 years.

Finally, the Call Committee will work with the Finance Board and Personnel Committee as well as with the Church Council to determine an appropriate compensation package and a job description, among other things.

Currently, the Call Committee is assembling appropriate information about the congregation and leadership capacities necessary to be the senior pastor of FLC. They'll create a key resource called a Ministry Site Profile to summarize this data. This document will be shared with the bishop and with all potential pastoral candidates, after being presented to the congregation for consideration. A presentation to review the substance of this document will be scheduled later this winter.

Please join the Call Committee as you and they regularly spend time in prayer along the way.



The synod representatives from the Minneapolis Area Synod along with our Bishop Jen Nagel, will give the Call Committee and our church solid support in this journey.

In the ELCA we are very fortunate that our pastoral candidates go through a process that allows congregations to get the best ELCA candidates available to meet the criteria for a church like First Lutheran. This is one of the many essential benefits of maintaining a solid partnership with our synod and the ELCA.

Thank you for your consideration on these matters. It's our intention to give updates to the congregation along the way. As you can tell, we're bathing this process in prayer so that God's name is glorified, and God's will be done in this holy adventure! Stay tuned!

Description of Funds

The Memorial Fund consists of gifts received from congregation members and friends in memory of loved ones. These gifts are often designated for a program or activity that was near and dear to the individual being memorialized. The Endowment Fund consists of gifts given for the long-term, future benefit of the congregation, as well as the earnings generated by those gifts. The Endowment Fund is a "permanent" fund in that the gifts received - or principal - are held in perpetuity ("Dollars Forever"). Only the earnings generated by the investment of these gifts are spent. Our investments have grown considerably in the past few years. These funds enable projects and purchases that would otherwise not be possible.

Report of the Board of Finance—Chris Larson

Dear First Lutheran Members,



reetings from the Board of Finance! Our board works closely with Jana Dietering, FLC's Director of Finance and Operations, as well as the Senior Pastor, to oversee the financial health of the congregation and provide good stewardship of the congregation's financial gifts and capital resources. Members of the Finance Board in 2024 included Chad Habeck (Chair), Jeff Beck (Vice-Chair), John Peterson, Rock Hauser, Jill Presseller and Chris Larson (Treasurer).

2024 proved to be a challenging financial year for FLC. Our envelope/electronic gifts were right on budget throughout the first five months of the year. But starting in June, our giving fell behind and never fully recovered. We expect to end the year by about 15% below budget in both general fund and mortgage & maintenance giving. We had to transfer \$45,000 from our limited undesignated reserves during the year, as well as borrow \$20,000 from the perpetual reserve (basically our internal line of credit). But we were fortunate to end the year with the blessing of three large special gifts during the months of November and December, which allowed us to repay the funds borrowed from the perpetual reserve in 2024 rather than include the repayment of those funds as a budgeted item in 2025.

Despite these financial challenges, we were still able to complete a number of facility maintenance projects in 2024 (some planned and others unexpected), including:

- Replacement of the sanctuary light bulbs, many of which had burned out.
- Installation of hand dryers in the bathrooms (the cost of this project was covered by a grant from Anoka County).
- Repair of the retaining wall by the offices, which was bowing and on the verge of caving in.
- Repair of the sanctuary air conditioner. This was a short-term fix, as the entire unit is beyond its useful life and will need to be replaced in 2025. (Estimated replacement cost is \$180,000.)
- Addition of blinds to the narthex (lobby) windows (the cost of this project was covered by endowment earnings).
- Facilities updates required by our charter school lease, including dividing one of the new classrooms, adding additional sinks in the boy's restroom and adding a fence to the playground.



Many other projects were completed this year, none of which would have happened without devoted volunteers and financial support from all our members. Thank you all for sharing your time, talents and resources with our congregation.
